Who can submit a proposal?

College, undergraduate, graduate and PhD students are encouraged to submit a presentation proposal in the fields of social sciences and humanities, arts and literature (SSHAL). According to the Fonds de recherche du Québec – Société et culture, SSHAL include the following fields of research:

- Arts, Literature and Society
- Writing and Fine Arts
- Cultures, Religions and Civilizations
- Development and Functioning of Individuals, Communities and Social Living
- Economy, Employment and Markets
- Education, Knowledge and Skills
- Fundamental Issues and Meaning of Life
- Organizational Management
- Language and Languages
- Media, Communication and Information
- Living Environments, Planning and Appropriation of Human Spaces
- The Nature, Transformation and Governance of Society and Institutions
- International Relations and Development

Call for proposals

for college or undergraduate students

College students from all <u>college-level programs</u>, both pre-university and technical, as well as undergraduate students who are interested in pursuing research in the fields of social sciences and humanities, arts and literature, are invited to submit a poster presentation, in French or in English. A full session will be reserved for them.

Call for proposals for graduate and PhD students

Graduate and PhD students are invited to give an oral presentation, in French or in English, in the fields of social sciences and humanities, arts and literature. The day's agenda will include multiple parallel sessions.

Call for proposals for inter-level teams

Both college and university students who are part of an inter-level team are invited to present either a poster or an oral presentation, in French or in English, in the fields of social sciences and humanities, arts and literature.

What criteria will be used to evaluate the proposals?

Here are some suggestions to help you produce an excellent resume. Use them as the basis for your own proposal. It is essential that your proposal be based on original research, with new findings. This is what the Evaluation Committees that review the proposals will be looking for. Moreover, the proposals selected by the committees will be published in various documents and, if they meet all criteria, may even be quoted. Your abstract is what will ultimately draw participants to your poster or to the room where you deliver your oral presentation.

Catchy title (maximum 30 words)

Full abstract (maximum 200 words)

- Choose a short, specific, informative and clear title that encapsulates the communication topic.
- Be creative: Use wording that will pique the curiosity of the evaluation committees as well as colloquium participants.
- Build your abstract in one paragraph, around the following four elements: a clear statement of the issue; a succinct description of the methodology; final or preliminary findings depending on the project's progress; and a conclusion.
- Statement of the issue: Describe the identified issue at the very beginning of the abstract, providing specific and engaging details to show that your presentation is well-structured and relevant to your target audience.
- Methodology: Provide a brief overview of the materials, as well as the procedures for sampling, collecting, managing and analyzing data.
- Results: If the results are not yet known, indicate that the data are being analyzed or collected and specify which aspects you will examine from which perspective. If the results are available, provide insights into their significance and, for example, explain how they compare to the initial expectations of the study.
- Follow the general principles of gender-neutral writing: Use neutral terms and inclusive wording whenever possible.
- Avoid redundant wording such as: "This poster shows that..."
- If references appear in the abstract, include a bibliography in the specified section.
- Use jargon-free language.
- When using abbreviations, first put the full expression, then the abbreviation.
- Only use mathematic formulas or statistics if these contribute to the clarity of your message.
- Proofread your proposal to check for spelling, syntax and style, and have someone you trust review it.
